Taking up issues raised in recent theoretical discussions, this lecture series investigates specific fields of cultural tension in early modern and Renaissance Europe from the perspective of «connected» or «shared» histories. The chosen topics enable us to bring together two currently largely distinct historiographies as they combine innovative studies on northern European societies in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries with research on global issues in the Italian Renaissance.

The SNSF founded interdisciplinary graduate program «Sites of Mediation» systematically investigates the interconnectedness of local and transnational processes within the areas of economy, art, and science. With a focus on early modern Antwerp, Basel and Venice the program's analytic, geographic and thematic framework contributes to a new urban history emphasizing entanglements and processes of mutual exchange of people, capitals, objects and knowledge on a small-scale as well as on a large-scale level.
